

We connected with the 21st Bn. on our right, and "C" Company, 60th. on our left.

April 14th:-

We still remained in the above position. During the day, the enemy heavily shelled the town of VIMY, especially the station, and any building or house, the cellar of which might be used.

This morning, the 14th., the 2nd Division went over at 5 a.m., and the 43rd Battalion were to have gone through us at the same time, and connected with the 2nd Division. As they were very late, Lieut. Dunning along with 15 O.Rs., went forward as a flank patrol, so as to keep connection with the 2nd Division, and endeavour to connect with the 43rd Battalion when they came up. This, Lieut. Dunning was unable to do, as the gap between the 2nd Division and the 43rd Battalion was too great. His patrol was fired ~~at~~ on by enemy machine gun, inflicting one ~~casualty~~ casualty. The party returned about 12.30 p.m.

At about 11 p.m., this evening, I received word that "A" Company would be relieved by "A" Company of the 58th Bn. The 58th Battalion were late in arriving, and the relief was not completed until about 4.20 a.m. following morning. The Company came out by platoons overland, ~~thru~~ passing through VIMY and up SUNKEN ROAD to SWISCHEN STELLUNG, past the TWIN, the ce GRANGE TUNNEL.
