	3/6/16		<p>One platoon was sent into R63 in close support of the 49th Bⁿ. The remainder of the Bⁿ whose progress had been greatly impeded by the concentrated shell fire were slowly making their way along trenches R64. R65 & R66 and up the communication trenches in rear. Our casualties at this time were extremely heavy both in Officers & men.</p> <p>at 1:30 pm further orders were given by Col. Greinbach for the 60th to make an attack from trenches R63 to R66 inclusive, the time set being 3 pm but on account of the heavy shelling and the deplorable condition of the line and communication trenches it was impossible to get the men in position by that time. A message was sent to Lt Col. Greinbach to his effect and asking him to set a later hour. About 5 pm orders were received to push and have all arrangements made to make an attack at 7 pm; Before this hour, however instructions were given to cancel the attack as the Brigade had decided not to go on with it.</p>	
Front line "R" Hooge sector	4/2/16		<p>Bⁿ remained in trenches. Two Coy's in R65 & R66 and two Coy's in Bond St during the day. On orders from the of Can Light Bde, at dusk the Bⁿ received the P.P.C.I. in Gaurack Rd, Warrington & Byland Aves, Hill St. & S. St. and continued to hold trenches R63-R64. The two Coy's in Bond St. moving to position via yeomanry Post. Relief completed by 11:30 pm. During the day the Bⁿ had been heavily shelled but casualties had not been heavy.</p>	Frie M
	5/6/16		<p>Intermittent shelling of our trenches during the day, otherwise all quiet.</p>	
	6/6/16		<p>at 1 a.m. Enemy apparently alarmed opened an intense bombardment of our trenches accompanied by heavy rifle and machine gun fire, this lasted for one hour. During the morning intermittent shelling from 2 to 4:30 pm after an intense bombardment of the R line enemy sprang mines at Hooge followed by an Infantry attack which succeeded in crossing the Merin Road and enemy were enabled to establish themselves somewhat in front of their old front line.
