May 22nd, 1916.

The Battalion will be relieved in the trenches on the night of May 23rd by the 52nd Canadian Battalion and go into Brigade Support until further advised.

2. "Primus" Stoves.

"A", "C" and "D" Companies will turn over to the relieving battalions 4 "Primus" Stoves each. All other stoves will be brought out for use in the new quarters. If any of the twelve stoves in the front line and support are defective, they must be replaced by others before relief is completed.

3. Periscopes.

All box periscopes, tin periscopes, and sniperscope periscopes, will be turned over to B. S. M. in Railway Dugouts.

4. Pistols. The eight small pistols will be retained by companies until arrival back in Camp. The six large illuminating pistols will be turned over to the B. S. M. in Railway Dugouts.

5. Sniperscopes.

Sniperscope frames, and short Lee-Enfield rifles used therewith will be turned in to the B. S. M. at Railway Dugouts.
